Chunky Monkey



-The Chunky Monkey strategy reminds me to look for chunks of letters and sounds in words that I already know.


-Chunking helps me read words faster, because I can blend chunks of sounds together instead of having to blend each individual sound.

-For example, If I come to a word like "flat", remind me that I already know what sound the "at" chunk makes, and that I can blend "fl-at" together more quickly than "f-l-a-t".

Remind me to look for chunks that I know when I get stuck on a word!

Stretchy Snake



-The Stretchy Snake strategy reminds me to stretch a word out *slowly* and put the sounds together.

-Vowel sounds are especially easy to stretch out. For example, if I am stuck on a word like "cat", help me read it like this: "caaaaa-t". First Grade readers try not to read words one sound at a time /c/-/a/-/t/.

-Ask me to show you how to stretch out a word!

Remind me to stretch out sounds slowly when I get stuck on a word!

Skippy Frog




-The Skippy Frog strategy reminds me to skip over a word I don't know. I can read to the end of the sentence and then hop back!

-Sometimes I can figure out a tricky word by using sentence clues. For example, I could skip over a word in the sentence "The ____ has a long neck". I know giraffes have long necks and I'm reading a book about zoo animals so ... I can make a good guess the tricky word is giraffe!

Remind me to skip over tricky words and read to the end of the sentence.

Lips the Fish



-Lips the Fish reminds me to get my lips ready to make the beginning sound when I come to a tricky word.

-Sometimes when I come to a word I don't know, I don't know how to get started. When this happens, remind me to get my lips and mouth ready.

-Our mouths form different shapes to make different sounds. For example, if I was going to make /l/ sound, my mouth would be open and my tongue would be touching the top of my mouth.

Remind me to get my lips ready to make the beginning sound!

Eagle Eye



-The Eagle Eye strategy reminds me to look at the pictures when I get stuck on a word.


-Many children's books include picture clues to help us decode more difficult words.

-For example, most beginning readers would not be expected to read a word like "elephant", so a picture of an elephant is likely to be on the page. Remind me to look at the pictures!

Flippy Dolphin



-Flippy the Dolphin reminds me to flip the vowel sound if the word doesn't sound right.


-Usually, if you are trying one vowel sound and the word doesn't sound right, it is most likely the other sound. If long a isn't working, I can try the short a sound.

- For example, think about a word like "kind". If I sound that out, I might use the short i sound, but it sounds wrong! Remind me to flip the vowel, and then the word will sound right!

Remind me to try flipping the vowel sound if a word doesn't sound right!

Tryin' Lion



-The Tryin' Lion strategy reminds me to keep trying and not to give up!

-When I am stuck on a word, there are many things I can try. Remind me to re-read the sentence and try a word that makes sense!

Remind me to keep trying and not give up when I get stuck on a word!


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
